The Elders met on the 5th January to nominate a new church Secretary to Church Members. The meeting will take place this Sunday 28th January*. I was not at the meeting as Brenda and I were enjoying three weeks of Sun, Sand and Sea in Goa, India.

On our return, last weekend, we received the sad news that Auntie Brenda (not a blood relative but Brenda's mum's oldest friend) had had a stroke. We visited after church last Sunday to be informed that pneumonia on top of the stroke meant she would not recover. Her niece and nephew, Barbara and Brian, and Brenda and myself spent long hours at the bedside. Her Minister visited on Monday and offered comfort through the words of God in Psalm 23 and the end of the Book of Revelations, and Prayers. We hoped that Auntie Brenda had heard the words but seemed unresponsive. Sleeping peacefully. Auntie Brenda did become responsive and recognise those around her for a couple of hours or so on Tuesday afternoon.

On Tuesday Brenda's mum, Eveline, slipped off her chair and the paramedics were called. Brenda was bringing her mum to hospital in the ambulance as I was also still there with a car. As Brenda and her mum arrived, at A&E, Auntie Brenda passed away peacefully. As I informed Brenda the paramedics took responsibility for her mum and sent us back to the bedside of Auntie B. We consoled Barbara, Brian and each other, and then returned to Brenda's Mum. Eveline.

The paramedics had seen Eveline through triage and she was now in a queue running at nearly three hours. On speaking to the Sister in charge she told me she had been briefed on the sad events and immediately moved Eveline to the top of the list. A man on a bed in a room, waiting for the doctor, was taken back onto the corridor and replaced with Eveline. We got back to Olive House at 2 in the morning, Eveline arrived by ambulance at 5am.

The day had been long and emotional. A&E was extremely busy with staff rushing about doing their business to help people. And yet with all the business of ambulance and hospital staff they all took time to pass on the details of what was happening elsewhere and the effect on the people concerned. They showed compassion and did what they could to make the situation as tolerable as possible, for us.

As I came to write this report Brenda reminded me of the feeding of the 5000. In Matthew's gospel chapter 14 verses 13 to 21 is the familiar story. But the context is given in verses 1 to 12 with the death and beheading of his cousin John the Baptist. Even in grief and mourning, Jesus showed compassion to the 5000 who had come to see and hear him. Fed them all before taking time by himself to pray.

I thank God, for the compassion showed by those involved in these sad events.

On Wednesday we were at last able to tell Eveline that her best friend had passed away. And comfort each other as a family. We all know that our father has a house with many rooms, one for us when our time comes. I think that brought peace to Auntie B, and comfort to those of us left behind.

SPRING FLOWERS

This year, spring in the northern hemisphere officially begins on 21st March. This is the month that is described as "coming in like a lion and going out like a lamb" but that does not mean the winter weather is over, particularly in this part of the world. Two years ago we had quite deep snow on the early May Bank Holiday and yet on 30th March 2017 a temperature of 78F was recorded in Cambridgeshire. Let's hope 78F will be recorded in Whitworth this year (any time of the year not just in March!!). Even though it is still pretty cold and sometimes quite dismal in February and March signs of spring are visible.

One of the first flowers to show its head is the snowdrop. The common snowdrop we normally see, with one flower per stem, has the name Galanthus nivalis which translates as "milk flower of the snow,". The snowdrop can survive snow and frost as it contains a natural anti-freeze. A substance called galamantine is extracted from snowdrops to be used in a treatment to slow down dementia in Alzheimer's disease.

Another plant seen in spring is the crocus. They are quite tough little flowers even persisting under a thick blanket of snow. The name comes from the Greek word krokos meaning saffron yellow. According to Greek legend, Crocus was the name of Greek noble who fell in love with a beautiful shepherdess. When the gods forbade his marriage Crocus killed himself. The Goddess Flora took pity on him and turned him into a flower,

Hellebores are now beginning to flower. The name originates from two Greek words "helle" which means to "take away" and "bora" which means "food". This name developed because of the properties of the plant. It was used to induce vomiting. Black hellebore was also used in the treatment of intestinal worms. Just imagine – and from such a pretty flower!

He thinks it is wonderful and could not be happier. We have told him we will be sending two more parcels to London in March 2018 for him to distribute when he next goes to Gambia.

When the first parcel was despatched to Gambia, we received a large box of chocolates from a well known firm in London in appreciation for our efforts. Secondhand Books

As many of you will already know, Margaret and I have decided that the time has come for us to stop running the weekly second hand book stall. The main reason is that with the advancing years it has seemed harder and, bearing in mind my disability, more dangerous to handle the larger boxes of books.

There has also been a definite drop in purchases during the last year; on one or two Sunday's we have not had a single sale. Since taking over the stall around 2005/6 we have made about £250 per year, all of which went directly into church funds. We believe book sales have contributed over £2750 in that time. Sadly, last year, sales barely exceeded £75.

If anyone would like to take over the running of the bookstall please let us know and we will help in any way we can. Otherwise, we will see what we can do to dispose of the remaining book stock.

We have enjoyed running the stall and would like to thank all those who have helped in any way – putting up and taking away the tables, bringing in books to sell and helping to take out and return the stock each week. Most important of all, thanks go to those who have regularly bought books from us and, by doing so, made a direct contribution to church funds.
