Secretaríal Musíngs

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." Acts 2:1-4

How do we trust that everything is in the hands of a God we can't even see? In a country and world more divided than ever, this passage is a beacon of hope for those despairing.

In the preceding passages, the disciples, betrayed by Judas, are searching for a new leader now that Jesus has died and ascended into heaven. They seem to be wondering the same thing we are: What now? To continue their work, the disciples seek to travel and spread the good news and story of Jesus, however, they are separated by language. How can they transfer their message if they don't speak the same language as people they are talking to?

Just then, the Holy Spirit comes down, in "what seemed to be tongues of fire" and settles to a rest on their shoulders. Suddenly, they are all speaking different languages, yet they can still understand one another! As they go out to spread the good news in these new languages, many accuse the disciples of drunkenness, as it is impossible for these Galileans to speak so many different tongues. Again, doubt is confronted.

The people in the Bible had doubts and so do we – we are all human. Today, how are we supposed to face doubts about our future when things seem so bleak? You see, when we are at our lowest, when we doubt the most, and when every door seems closed, the Holy Spirit comes down and beckons us toward God. By providing presence and hope, God changes everything.

Donald's Doddles

Last week at the Masseycroft service we were thinking about the important place music has in our lives. Not a day goes by without some kind of music being present; even if it is only my contribution by coaxing a tune out of the assembled crockery and jars on the breakfast table. Music in the right hands and in the right environment becomes something beautiful and pleasing. It affects us in different ways. Gives us joy, lifts our spirit, takes us out of ourselves and moves us into a different realm. Why? I believe that all music is a gift from God, one that is able to enrich our lives, stir our emotions and provides us with a means to worship as we are moved into a better frame of mind.

The world renowned conductor André Rieu, believes that his choice of music is able to heal. To quote his words: "People arrive in wheelchairs and walk out unaided". His music lifts minds above the worries and hurts of life. For me it can be a hymn tune, a glorious singing voice or a brass band in full flow that raises the hairs on the back of my neck. Some music is very cathartic, cleaning out the dross and damaging thoughts that sometimes become embedded in our minds.

Hallfold has a long standing reputation for its contribution to music, not only in worship but through organ and piano recitals, and also G&S operas. Sadly, the once very active choir (winner of the Blackpool church choir competition about 70 years ago) and the augmented choir that annually sang Handel's Messsiah, helped by famous soloists has now gone into the realms of history. However we still have something to be glad about and that is the fact that we have a good organist and we still raise the roof when the hymns demand it. Colin must spend quite some time choosing the tunes and also the appropriate stops on the organ to compliment the words. Also, in communion, the quiet rendering of well known tunes keeps our minds from wandering away from what we are celebrating. Just notice how he manages to time the end of the piece to the end of the distribution of the bread and wine! Today not many churches have a good organist, so we are fortunate because we enjoy the way the organ helps our sense of worship.

I believe the whole of creation sings with the breath of God's presence, from the very first primeval seas, with the sounds of their tireless waves ebbing and flowing, to the winds that cut through the ancient forests. Recently, as I sat in the quietness of the early morning, the birds were singing their little hearts out. Streams and rivers play their part. Who hasn't stood on a river bank and listened to the trickle of the water as it flows to ever wider rivers and finally into the restless sea? All nature has a voice, so it isn't surprising that we like to sing and find music necessary to enrich and give meaning to our lives. So, come and join us in church as often as possible. Give thanks to God for our hearing and pleasure that music gives us. Don't waste this wonderful gift from our gracious loving Creator.
